Course Description

Drawing I is a beginning drawing course designed to introduce and familiarize students with the basics of drawing. The theme of the course is drawing what one sees, and it focuses on introducing drawing techniques, comprehension of terminology, and material use. The course relies on drawing assignments and four graded projects, including the final project. Students must also keep a sketchbook throughout the semester. At the end of the course, students will discuss their progress with the instructor and turn in their final portfolio.

Course Goals

1. To learn to draw what one sees.
2. To introduce the student to drawing techniques.
3. To learn and practically apply drawing terminology.
4. To introduce to student to drawing materials.

5. To expand and maintain the students 'practice of drawing.

Module 1: Introduction to Drawing Basics

- Topic: Fundamentals of line, shape, form, and setting up a geometrical still life composition
- Project: 1 x Geometrical Still Life Drawing
- Learning goal: Basic elements of art and composition principles

Module 2: Shading Techniques

- Topic: Shading, hatching, cross-hatching, and value scales applied to simple forms
- Project: Practice sheets with shading exercises on geometric shapes
- Learning goal: Identifying and applying shading methods

Module 3: Surrealist Drawing Foundations

- Topic: Principles of surrealism, imagination, and combining unrelated elements creatively
- Project: 1 x Surrealist Drawing (experimental composition)
- Learning goal: Key surrealist artists and techniques

Module 4: Drawing Fruits – Form and Texture

- Topic: Observing and rendering organic shapes, textures, and details of various fruits
- Project: 1 x Still Life Drawing of Fruits (focus on accuracy and variety)
- Learning goal: Anatomy and textural differences in common fruits

Module 5: Composing with Random Objects

- Topic: Arranging and drawing everyday random objects with attention to overlap and negative space
- Project: Preliminary sketches of object arrangements for final still life
- Learning goal: Composition rules for complex still life

Module 6: Integrated Still Life Mastery

- Topic: Combining fruits and objects in a complete still life, including light source and shadows
- Project: 1 x Complete Still Life Drawing With Objects and Fruits

- Learning goal: Analyzing light, shadow, and unity in still life
- Note: Midterm Evaluation (instructor feedback on submitted work)

Module 7: Perspective Basics with Cubes

- Topic: Understanding cubes in space, horizon lines, and vanishing points introduction
- Project: Multiple cube drawings exploring basic perspective distortions
- Learning goal: Core concepts of linear perspective

Module 8: One-Point Perspective Application

- Topic: Constructing scenes and objects using one-point perspective rules
- Project: 1 x Complete One-Point Perspective Drawing (e.g., interior or road scene)
- Learning goal: Rules and common errors in one-point perspective

Module 9: Two-Point Perspective Application

- Topic: Building complex forms and architecture with two-point perspective
- Project: 1 x Complete Two-Point Perspective Drawing (e.g., building or corner view)
- Learning goal: Differences between one- and two-point perspective

Module 10: Facial Features – Eyes, Nose, Lips

- Topic: Proportions, structure, and detailed rendering of individual facial elements
- Project: Isolated studies of eyes, nose, and lips with shading
- Learning goal: Proportional relationships in facial features

Module 11: Complete Human Face Portrait

- Topic: Assembling features into a full face, including skin tones, hair, and expression
- Project: 1 x Complete Drawing of Human Face (portrait from reference)
- Learning goal: Overall facial proportions and common portrait pitfalls
- Note: Final Evaluation (comprehensive review of final portfolio and progress)
