## **Intercultural Communication**

#### **Course Description**

In this course we will mainly study communication norms, values and beliefs from countries throughout the world. Class activities and projects will explore cultural awareness, cultural sensitivity and techniques for effective communication within global contexts and careers.

### **Course Goals**

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Detect cultural communication norms, values and beliefs.
- 2. Identify practices and customs of individual cultures.
- 3. Conduct cultural research and use the findings to tailor verbal and nonverbal communication.
- 4. Apply concepts and theories of intercultural communication to a wide range of contexts, including interpersonal, leadership, business, social career, healthcare and global.
- 5. Identify the influence culture has on communication, language nonverbal communication, prejudice/stereotypes and gender roles.
- 6. Discern how cultural differences shape the communication process.

- 7. Analyze the impact of an individual's personal worldview, beliefs, culture and bias on communicating with others.
- 8. Produce presentations of research and applied intercultural concepts.

#### **Course Requirements**

- 1. Course material, projects, and assignments will be available to students on a weekly basis. This means that you have a limited amount of time to complete your projects and assignments after which period the material will no longer be accessible to students. Please pay careful attention to due dates because they vary for each assignment/project in the course.

**Discussion Posts:** There will be 3 discussion posts throughout the course. They will be brief answers to the topic discussed from that week' s textbook content and video lectures.

- Introductory Discussion: For this assignment you will you write a brief introduction about yourself and introduce yourself to the class. In 1-2 paragraphs you will tell us your name, age, where you are going to school, major, and career aspirations. Then, you will discuss some personal content about yourself such as interests, hobbies, likes/dislikes, where you are from and family. Finally, I would like for you to discuss why you are taking this class and what you hope to learn from it.
- Communication Methods Discussion: For this assignment you will discuss a specific form of communication. You will discuss this method's history and the evolution throughout time to the present. Then, discuss the positives and negative aspects of it.
- Culture Comparison Discussion: For this discussion post you will compare your culture to another culture of your choosing. You will discuss the similarities and differences between the two cultures.

**Chapter Activity-Lesson Plan:** For this assignment you will be assigned or choose a chapter from the textbook and create a lecture for it. You will need to make a detailed outline and PowerPoint about the chapter. Additionally, you will create an in-class activity assignment to teach the material to the class.

**Research Analysis Project:** The first part of this assignment involves doing a research analysis on communication and culture. It will involve a 5 page double spaced paper about the topic. To begin you will define communication and explain its history. Then, you will choose one cultural group in society and discuss its various forms of communication and relate it to a chapter in the textbook. The paper should be in proper MLA and include a title page and works cited (bibliography for sources) page.

The second part of this project involves creating a PowerPoint presentation to accompany the research paper. The PowerPoint should include an introduction, table of contents, main points, and summary. More details will be provided in a separate document during the semester.

**Exams:** There will be 3 exams for this course. They will be based on the assigned reading from the textbook and PowerPoints. Exams are NOT cumulative, meaning they will not include questions based on the prior exam content.

**FINAL GRADES:** Your final grade will be based on the work you submit and exams. The level of effort you have expended, the urgency of your need to pass this course, the personal circumstances that burden you this term, and all other such considerations are not relevant.
