Course Description

This course introduces the evolution of Chinese cinema in its historical and cultural contexts. We will study some of the main theoretical and historical approaches to Chinese cinema, examines its relations to other national cinemas and its unique development. Through a combined practice of viewing, reading, discussing, and writing, we will learn to unpack the attitudes and values expressed in Chinese films produced in different eras and dealing with diverse human experiences. We will become familiar with important events, people, places, and issues in Chinese culture and society through the film medium.
