# **Course Description**

Drawing I is a beginning drawing course, designed to introduce and familiarize students to the basics of drawing. The theme of the course is drawing what one sees, and focuses on the introduction to drawing techniques, comprehension of terminology, and material use. The course relies on in-class drawing assignments and four graded projects, including the final project. Students also must keep a sketchbook throughout the semester. At the end of the course students will discuss progress with the instructor and turn in final portfolio.

# Course Assignment, Examination, and or Project Policies

#### Attendance:

Attendance during our midterm and final live meetings are mandatory. Attendance on weekly live sessions conducted by the instructor and/or class TA are highly recommended and considered a key to success in this class. Students will be given feedback on their progress during these meetings.

#### **Exams**

There will be no written exam held in this course. The course is based on studio work and critiques done upon finishing each assignment given by the instructor on specific dates. The outcome of these critiques together with completed portfolio, will determine each student's final grades.

#### Sketchbook:

The practice of maintaining a sketchbook is vital to the class, and students are expected to keep a sketchbook outside of class. The subject matter for the sketchbook will expand on the in-class assignments project. The direction for the sketchbook is directed through assignment guidelines. Grading is based on quantity and quality of the sketches, as well as their consistent production.

# Projects:

A total of 7 projects are designed to determine the students' progress throughout the semester. Students must follow each week's assignment on the syllabus and watch the videos for instructions on how to finish these projects.

### Activity:

Students are expected to do the daily drawing assignments in class. Daily grades are given and which accumulate at the end of the semester which contribute to the final participation grade. Other criteria are based on adherence to the attitude guidelines and the students' work in class based on taking critique, following instruction, and challenging one's self.

# Final Portfolio:

At the end of the semester, students are expected to turn in a Final Portfolio. This is due during the individual critiques, and will contain drawings that demonstrate the students growth throughout the semester and also includes the **projects** and student's personal **sketchbook**.
